
- Thank you to everyone that was involved with "Fill the Boot". A check was presented to the Police Department from the Brown County Community Foundation in the amount of \$3,591.00



PADENDUM 2 4 Pages Eclipse - April 8, 2024

On April 8th, 2024, Brown County will play host to one of nature's most impressive phenomena: a total eclipse. This eclipse is a rare and spectacular celestial event that will bring thousands of visitors to Brown County and Nashville.

- . This eclipse is a total solar eclipse, meaning that the moon will completely block the sun, creating a stunning visual effect known as the "corona."
- It is extremely important to protect your eyes when viewing the eclipse - without protection, the sun's rays will focus in the back of the eye and damage the retina. The damage may not be noticed until hours or days later and cause you to see straight lines as wavy, notice a spot in vision, and have blurred vision.
- To protect your eyes, obtain special, certified viewing glasses or use other methods such as pinhole projectors.

When is the total solar eclipse coming to Indiana:

In the Nashville area the partial eclipse begins at 1:50pm and ends at 4:23pm. In the middle of that time, from 3:05pm to 3:09pm, the total eclipse occurs.

How to Prepare for Eclipse Visitors:

Prepare for crowds, traffic, and congestion in Brown County. Avoid commuting during the eclipse. Local stores may experience empty shelves and restaurants will be filled to capacity. Do understand medical response will be greatly impacted by traffic congestion. Save difficult, strenuous, or risky activities until after April 8, 2024.

Preparing Yourself for the Eclipse


Medical Supplies:

- Don't schedule doctor appointments for April 8, 2024.
 Consider rescheduling any existing medical appointments until after April 9th.
- Pay close attention to dialysis timing and scheduling;
 April 8th and 9th may not be ideal.
- Consider the appointment schedule for deliveries of medical supplies like oxygen.
- Secure alternate sources of power for your electrically powered medical devices.
- Refill prescriptions: Inventory your medications well in advance to ensure you don't need to visit the pharmacy between the April 6-9th or rely on mail-delivered medication during this time. Make sure there's at least a one-week supply of medication on hand, including refills for chronic conditions.



• Gather medical supplies: Ensure essentials like insulin, glucose monitors, thermometers, and any necessary medical equipment are readily available.

Food and Safety Supplies:



- Have food and drinks on hand. Choose easily prepared and nutritious options like canned goods, dried fruits, nuts, and bottled water. Don't forget about pet food if applicable.
- Have essential supplies such as batteries, flashlights, a battery-powered radio, and first aid kit.

Home Preparation:

- Prepare for power outages: Contact Stacy if essential medical equipment relies on electricity. Have flashlights and battery-powered alternatives for light and communication.
- Charge all mobile phones and tablets. Have power banks/charging blocks available.
- Your pet's behavior may change as they become confused by the unusual change in daylight.
- Inform family and friends: Let loved ones know about the eclipse preparations and your plan. Do consider staying with a caregiver. Our county's resources will be stretched during April 4th-9th, especially during the day of the eclipse on Monday, April 8th, 2024.

Additional Tips:

- Have contact information handy: Keep emergency contact numbers readily available.

- Plan entertainment options such as DVDs, books, puzzles, or board games to stay entertained during April 4-9th.
- Prepare mentally: Discuss concerns and potential scenarios with the family and staff.
- Visitors will certainly become lost as they try to circumvent traffic congestion by using our back roads. Do be prepared to give directions and be patient with those using your driveways to turn around.
